UMPIRE DEVELOPMENT

Letters to all umpires who applied to advance their grading were sent out last month. In total, seven people have been moved from M5 to M4 and four from M4 to M3 for the 2026 season.

Letters from Allan Taylor (WEPL Umpire Chair) were sent to all umpires who served on one of the three WEPL panels (P1, P2 & Devt) last season and to those umpires who have been invited to join the Development Panel for 2026. Please note that no individual letters are sent to umpires who stood in Tier 3 but are not on the WEPL Devt Panel, nor people who stand in B & D or GCL.

Umpires who have received an invite to officiate on one of the WEPL panels should reply to Allan Taylor (cc Les Clemenson as WEPL Appointments Officer & Bob Owen as CDO) before Christmas to confirm their acceptance or otherwise.

Captains' feedback from 2025 for both B & D and GCL has been available to umpires on a weekly basis throughout the summer. Feedback from WEPL captains, embargoed during the season, is now available to view via WTU.

NEW UMPIRE COURSES

The first umpire course of the close-season, the one-day, ECB 'Introduction to Umpiring' is being held at Archway School in Stroud on Sunday 23rd November. As part of the ECB/GCF's efforts to encourage more women and girls to take their first steps in officiating, this is a female-only course.

There will be further Introduction to Umpiring, Umpire Development, club and 14-19 courses taking place around the county between Christmas and the start of the 2026 season.

MONEY MATTERS by John Lindley



Expenses for appointments nigh on 2000 of them!

To answer many of the queries that are raised, information on expenses that have been paid is shown on the Expenses page of the GACO website.

The September issue of OM gave details of umpire appointments to the range of over 1150 fixtures (just under 2300 umpires, given a few games only had one

official) that were dealt with by GACO in 2025. In addition, there are requests for scorers to cover over 150 match appointments across the season. So, in all, a demand for at least 2400 appointed officials over the course of the summer. Although the Saturday league fixtures are completed at the end of August, that is not the end of the season, as there are also several non-league matches in September and sadly, whilst not all appointment requests are met, the vast majority are.

To date, we have received claims for just under 2000 appointments to matches across a range of over 20 different organisations, each with their own invoicing requirements and payment routines. Where funds have been received from the match organisers, the

payments have been made to people who provided timely claims. End-of-season invoices to GCCC have been submitted for adult and youth fixtures in August and September and payments for appointments to those matches will be made once those invoices are settled.

Late claims, together with duplicated and incorrect or mis-matched information on claims, not only affects the person submitting the claim, but potentially also delays payment to their colleagues on the day.

To people who have raised queries about claims and payments, they will be answered, but given the above, there may be a slight delay.

GACO END-OF-SEASON EVENT



The end-of-season Presentation Evening was held at Hatherley & Reddings CC on Friday 10th October, with the First-Class umpire, Paul Baldwin, as the special guest.

Paul gave an entertaining insight into his officiating experiences both before and during his first-class career and responded to members' queries in a Q & A session which preceded the excellent buffet and presentation of awards.

Ian Purchase won the 'Umpiring Newcomer' shield, an award for umpires in their first two seasons on the circuit, while Andrew Sherbourne and Ian Martin were runners-up.

ΑII awards had three nominated finalists, each of whom received a Fearnley Twyford voucher, with House CC scorer. Carol Phil Lewis Froom. Lydney CC and Sue Jones, Bradley Stoke Almondsbury CC scorer the eventual 'Scorer of the Year' contenders. 


Alan Payne receiving the B&D UOTY award from Norman Cowans

GLOUCESTERSHIRE CRICKET FOUNDATION NEWS with Nicky Clarke



Whilst the 2025 season might be a distant memory, GCF is now turning its attention to upskilling volunteers ahead of next season, and officiating is front and centre of our plans.

GCF will also be teaming up with GACO to deliver the ECB Umpires Course in the North and South of the county as well as both formal and informal CPD opportunities to ensure our umpires are fighting fit for the start of the 2026 season.

Additionally, I'll be working with Sue Drinkwater to ensure our scorer members are supported as the new Scorers' Pathway is launched and CPD opportunities are available to anyone who wishes to learn the art of linear scoring and DLS.

Away from officiating, GCF is in the depths of planning for the ICC Women's T20 World Cup as Gloucestershire CCC is one of the host venues. There will be plenty of activation events in the lead-up to the official start on Friday 12th June when England take on Sri Lanka at Edgbaston. Bristol hosts its games between 21st and 27th June, playing host to Pakistan, Sri Lanka, South Africa, New Zealand and the West Indies, as well as two qualifying teams. We hope that throughout the activation events and the games themselves, there will be plenty of opportunities for our officiating community to get involved, perhaps enjoying a fixture of two from the stands instead of the middle!

Finally, we are planning the Get Into Cricket 4.0, our programme for volunteers aged 14-18 and are hoping to launch a girls-only volunteer programme, where officiating plays a big part in the training and volunteer opportunities. Watch out for more information!



INDOOR CRICKET with Jim Hyland



As the days shorten, the leaves fall and 'Strictly' returns to our screens, the indoor cricket season begins.

For those not familiar with the indoor version, it's a short format game, usually 6 a-side, 10 or 12 overs per innings and

played in halls approximately 35/40m x 12/15m – typically, 5/6 badminton courts side by side.

Bowling and fielding is fast and fun and once used to the hard surfaces and angles involved, it very much replicates the outdoor game, albeit considerably quicker with lots of run out opportunities.

Batting, on the other hand, is a tad more subtle – the boundary wall behind the bowler counts as 4 & 6, hitting any other wall or the ceiling scores one run, batters completing a run are actually awarded two, while if you do both, you score three. The majority of runs are accumulated in 2s & 3s, with clever batters finding gaps and manipulating the field, though they can be caught out off all the walls & ceiling except the far boundary wall.



The nuances of the game can be a great leveller, creating an environment where those playing several levels apart in the summer can enjoy their cricket together – in one Cheltenham match last winter, the ages of the 12 players ranged from 16 to 62, with those involved coming off SDCA, GCL & WEPL summer seasons and taking part in a game that was very closely contested.

It is cricket with a smile, everyone involved enjoying the sport through the dark winter months without any of the angst sometimes associated with the summer Saturday leagues. Ironically, the indoor season, which runs from early September to late March, is longer in duration than the outdoor one and over 250 matches played without a single rain break calculation!

The popularity of indoor cricket continues to grow in the county and is well supported by GCF, GACO and our two long-standing sponsors, 'Martin Berrill Sports' and 'Cheltenham Refrigeration Limited'.

The Gloucester League now has 18 teams across 3 divisions playing at King's School, while Cheltenham boasts one of the best indoor cricket halls in the south-west, a floor

that does not require a mat, uniform wall & ceiling surfaces with none of the usual paraphernalia attached, a safe, enclosed space for the striker's end umpire to stand, plus an excellent viewing balcony – 23 teams form 4 divisions constitute this league.



These leagues, along with various Bristol-based competitions, feed a County Play-off that will take place in February 2026 and that feeds into the National Indoor 6s competition which starts in March, with Regional and National finals being held at the indoor cricket centres at Taunton and Lord's respectively.

This year, Hartpury College will host the BUCS South-West Regional indoor competition, with university teams from Cardiff, Bristol, Exeter, UWE, Gloucester, USW & Hartpury showcasing their skills on three Sundays and one Saturday during October and November. This in turn feeds into a National 8s finals day at Edgbaston.

September's Conundrum



It's the 19th over of a T20 game and the opening batter, who's on 99 not out, pulls a short ball to deep backward square and sets off for a celebratory single. As the batter plays the shot however, his helmet strap breaks and the helmet, despite having no contact with either bat or ball, falls directly on to the stumps, knocking both bails to the floor. Both batters make their ground – the main man raises his willow in triumph while the fielding side appeal vociferously. What do you do?

Call dead ball. The batter is neither a centurion nor out. This is a recent amendment to the laws, which was initiated in the interest of player safety to try to ensure all batters don protective headwear. If the batter had been wearing a cap/hat, rather than a helmet and this had fallen on and dislodged the bails, the batter would have been given out, 'hit wicket'.
